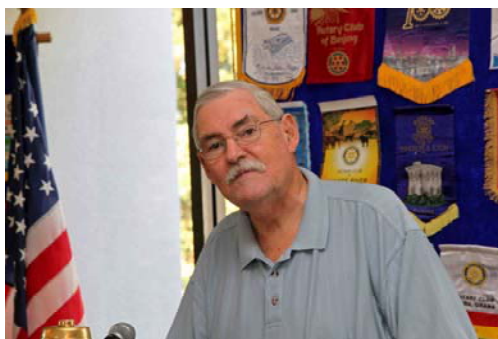

Program:

Bill Clarkson introduced the guest speaker today- Ali Eshraegi – who is a Rotary Peace Scholar candidate. Among other accomplishments, Ali attended UC Berkeley School of Journalism and has a PhD in political science. Ali's talk today was titled Playing Chess with a Gorilla which symbolizes the struggle of Iran's people against the government. The people of Iran live in an environment of silent protests, military forces killing innocent citizens, arrests. Yet, in the last election, Iran saw the highest rate of participation. Iran has one of the highest rates of inflation in the Middle East. It is an ancient civilization of over 7000 years – formerly known as Persia. There are nearly 75 million people in Iran with nearly 70% living in urban areas. Ali described many of the struggles and political issues, talked about the role of the US government in Iranian affairs and the hopes for the country. He spoke of 'putting the gorilla in the cage of democracy, and teaching them to play chess.'

The Expansion across America

(By 1909, Rotary Clubs were forming up rather regularly, particularly in the West, due in large part to the efforts of Homer Wood, "the secret ingredient" in Rotary.)

Immensely satisfied, Paul Harris shared the news of the westward expansion with his fellow club members in Chicago. He had proven, while avoiding a confrontation with the doubters, that Rotary was as inspiring a concept in other cities as it was in their own town. *(But opposition from some vocal members of his club continued.)*

"Their opposition caused me deep concern at a time when my burdens were many and heavy," Paul later admitted. To ease those burdens in managing a fast-growing club, he appointed an executive committee, and those officers generally felt that the success on the West Coast could motivate some in Rotary One to help develop the movement in the East.

New York was the obvious first city targeted, and Paul Harris wrote to Daniel L. Cady, an old University of Vermont friend who was now practicing law in Manhattan. Cady was interested *(and)* on 18 August 1909 hosted a meeting in his office for local businessmen Elmer De Peu and Arthur Bullock. Fred Tweed *(one of the 1905 Chicago Club members)* soon joined them. The visitor spoke enthusiastically for an hour on the Rotary concept, the benefits to all concerned, and its evolving focus on civic service. *(They moved on to lunch, followed by more discussions in Bullock's office that afternoon.)* By the time the meeting ended, it was their unanimous decision to bring Rotary to New York.

. . . . *(On)* 24 August 1909, 26 men gathered for dinner at the Café Martin on Fifth Avenue and 26th Street and decided to charter the Rotary Club of New York. *(Arthur)* Bullock became the engine that helped drive the movement into other cities, too. He printed an eight-page brochure titled "Rotary Is One Kind of Thing and Every Other Club Is Something Else" and mailed it to friends and business contacts in cities where he thought there should be a club.
